You and a partner will be learning all about Ancient China. There will be 5 steps for you to complete. Each step has a mini-project at the end that you and your partner will need to finish. You will research and use the Internet together. You will each need to do your own work on the miniprojects. Pieces of these mini-projects will be compiled into an Ancient Chinese Museum Artifact Book. This book will need to be turned in to Mrs. Stocking.

Step One: Inventions

Click on the picture to read about Chinese Inventions. Then make a list, 5 or more, of those inventions, how they came to be and the dates they were created.

Then, the curator is missing information about some of the inventions that the Ancient Chinese are credited for. You and your partner will need to choose only <u>ONE</u> of the invention options below.

Inventions: Gunpowder



Task Credits

China is the center of gunpowder, firecrackers, and other explosives. Learn about the history of firecrackers. (Click on the firecracker...)

On a 1/2 sheet of art paper, you and your partner must each design a firecracker. (You are each designing your own firecracker!) You must color it with at least 3 colors. Do you need ideas? Click on the lightbulb to see examples of firecrackers.

On the back of your firecracker you will need to answer the following questions:

- Why was the invention of gunpowder so important?
- How would history be different without explosives?

When you are done, click the arrow to move to step two.

Step Two: Beliefs

Beliefs: Mythology

Select 3 myths to read. (Notice that they are not long.)



- On a lined piece of paper, write the name of each myth that you read and a brief summary of the myth. Each summary should only be about 3 sentences long.
- The curator is missing the cover for one of his ancient mythology books. The book is titled, "Mythology of Ancient China". Create a cover for this book. Some things to consider before you create the cover:
 - Where will the title go?
 - Who will the book be by? Or, will it be by anyone?
 - What kind of artwork should be on the cover?
- When you are done, click on the arrow to go to step 3.



Beliefs: Philosophy

There were two Main beliefs of Philosophy.

- . Confucius and Daoism.
- Daoism traces its roots to 6th century B.C. The primary belief is the learning and practicing of "The Way." Or the ultimate truth to the universe.

- The museum wants you to create a Confucius art poster.
- . Write 3 Confucius like sayings on paper. Paint a scenery picture on the paper as well. (Include your name & class on the back)
- When you are done, click the arrow to go to step 3.



Step Three: Dynasties



A dynasty is a series of rulers who all belong to the same family. Ancient China's first dynasty was the Shang. By 1788 B.C. the Shang family had grown so powerful it was able to take control of much of China.

Click on the emperor picture to see a timeline of the dynasties.

On a piece of paper make a bar graph, naming each of the Chinese dynasties and how long they reigned.

Then pick a dynasty to work on further:





Qing Dynasty





- The first emperor of this dynasty, Qin Shi Huang wanted to be remembered forever. Click on the picture of the warrior to read about how he did that.
- The Curator would like to be able to display a warrior statue. Use the clay to create your own warrior statue.
 - Make sure your warrior is able to stand, has details in design and place him on the cardboard.
 - Write your name, class, and class number on the cardboard.
- When you are done, click the arrow to go to step 4.



Míng Dynasty



- In early Ming Dynasty China, when they were at war the people built massive walls to divide the states, so they were protected within their own land. Click on the website below to read more about the Great Wall of China.
 - <u>Great_Wall</u>



- Click on the Great Wall of China icon to see a really fabulous picture of the Great Wall.
- Using the bag of sugar cubes, glue, and the small block of cardboard, build a replica of the Great Wall to display for the Curator.
 - Include a section of the wall and a guard tower. No eating the cubes!
- When you are done, click the arrow to go to step 4.



Step Four: Social Class



In ancient Chinese Society, the social structure of 1046-256 BC divided the Chinese people into four broad categories.

- Click on the image to read about the social structure.
- The museum needs a short summary on each category. On a lined paper, list each category and 3 sentences about each. Then, choose one of social classes below:



Social Class: Rich





- In Ancient China, it was easy to tell who was rich. They had the best clothes, jewelry and better food.
- Using the picture, read about wealthy Chinese style of house.
- The Curator needs to display a display of a wealthy Chinese home for the museum. Imagine that you are a Chinese architect. Design a home for a wealthy Chinese family.
 - . Remember to include: Kitchen, Dining room, Bedrooms for each person, Music room, Lounge, Garden, Front Court.
 - Also, remember the house should balance, same room shape & same number of rooms on both sides.

When you are done, click the arrow to go to step 5.

Social Class: Poor



- The Poor people worked hard. Their lives were very different from those of the rich.
- Using the picture, read about the life of the poor.
- Pretending that you were a farmer in ancient China, the curator would like you to replicate a sales poster.
 - On this poster, show what items you have for sale, how much they cost, your hours of operation, and your location, etc.
- When you are done, click the arrow to go to step 5.
